Contract law 101 – content and form

- Contract comprises more than just what is written
- Statutory requirements (generally can't contract out)
 - Building Act
 - Domestic Building Act
 - Building Code of Australia
 - ACL / Fair Trading Acts
 - SOP Act
 - OH&S / WH&S Acts
 - Unfair Contracts Act
- Terms implied at law



Contract law 101 – content and form (cont)

- Building Acts
 - Licencing requirements
 - Legislative basis of Building Code of Australia
- Domestic / Home Building Acts
 - Form and content requirements
 - Restrictions on certain works
 - Implied warranties
- Jurisdiction and work specific



Contract law 101 – parties to the contract

- Privity of contract
 - Contract is between the parties to it
 - Generally no obligations and duty of care to third parties
 - Generally no recovery rights against third parties
- Agency relationships
 - Agents enter into contracts on other's behalf
 - Rights and responsibilities owed by and to the 'other', not the agent



Working in the NDIS

- The trouble with template agreements
 - Not aligned with statutory requirements
 - Not tailored to your works
- Who's your contract with?
 - NDIA, provider, participant?
- Capacity of participants
- Some statutory requirements can be subcontracted
